DRESS CODE FOR THE 3RD UNIVERSITY DAY CELEBRATION

July 30, 2024

3:00 PM onwards at the University Gymnasium of Tandag Campus

Those taking their oath as newly appointed or promoted employees will be in Barong Tagalog and Filipiniana.

For all other attendees:

The Mamanwa and Manobo are indigenous groups in the Philippines, particularly in Surigao del Sur. Each has a unique culture and traditional accessories. Both groups use their accessories to express their identity, cultural heritage, and social status. Each piece carries specific symbolic meanings and is often handmade with traditional techniques passed down through generations.

Option A: All other attendees will be wearing **shirts and trousers with tribal accessories** such as the following:

Mamanwa

1. Beaded Necklaces and Bracelets

The Mamanwa people are known for their intricate beadwork. They create colorful necklaces and bracelets using various beads, shells, and seeds.

2. Headdresses

They often wear headbands or headdresses adorned with beads and sometimes feathers.

3. Earrings and Pendants

Made from natural materials such as seeds, bones, and shells.

Manobo

1. Tangkulo

A colorful headscarf or turban worn by men, often with elaborate embroidery or beadwork.

2. Beaded Jewelry

Like the Mamanwa, the Manobo are skilled in beadwork, creating intricate necklaces, bracelets, and anklets.

3. Tassels and Fringes

Clothing and accessories often feature decorative tassels and fringes.

4. Bells and Shells

Accessories may include small bells and shells attached to clothing and jewelry to create a distinctive sound when moving.

5. Arm Bands and Leg Bands

Made from various materials, including metal, plant fibers, and beads.

Option B: Women wear Manobo woven skirts and blouses (traditional garments) with detailed embroidery, while men wear traditional woven shirts and trousers.

Option C: Smart Casual with tribal accessories enumerated above.

Option D: Modern Barong/Filipiniana.

Option E: Modern Barong/Filipiniana or katutubong kasuotan with batik clothing.
(Key officials of the University are highly encouraged for this option.)
